Building Successful Coalitions in Rural Communities for Public Education Advocacy

Higher Education and Rural America are Facing a Watershed Moment

It has been 160 years since the Morrill Land Grant College Act was passed and rural students continue to enroll at four-year universities at lower rates than their non-rural peers. The lower matriculation rate has implications for a fair chance for a good life because a college education can provide an individual with greater employment options, higher income potential, and improved health and quality of life. Recommendations and implications from a single case study in Indiana exploring the perceptions of rural high school students regarding college and how higher education and businesses can enhance educational aspirations for rural students.

Fostering Rural Resilience and Economic Development through School-University-Community Partnership

In addition, this session will highlight social justice advocacy interventions that have the potential to reduce the impact of poverty and ongoing concerns in rural communities. Valuing and Communicating what Matters to Rural Stakeholders with Social Return on Investment

This session investigates program outcomes of a program in Appalachia using Social Return on Investment (SROI) as a comprehensive framework for measuring and communicating social, environmental, and economic impact. In this case example, the SROI framework is used as a systems approach to quantifying complex ripple effects in the ecotone of a Learning Ecosystem, a theoretical model that includes the environment as a key stakeholder of an ecological approach to education. SROI values outcomes sourced through democratic process with stakeholders and communicates changes in the universal language of money, allowing for communication of outcomes that matter to rural community viability.

Policy Playbook: Findings & Recommendations

As part of the Rural Imperative Initiative, funded by The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, 5 regional organizations supported teachers to create regional 'Policy Playbooks' on local, regional, and national recommendations. Five major themes emerged across all groups:

- Teacher Recruitment & Retention
- Rural Education Funding
- Broadband/Technology Access
- Mental Health
- Housing & Transportation

The 5 organizing partners were The University of Tennessee-Chattanooga (Appalachia), The University of West Alabama (Black Belt), Arizona Rural Schools Association (Borderlands), Missouri State University (Rust Belt), and CSU-Chico and North State Together (Northern California). These regional rural teacher caucuses strengthen teacher advocacy and connected policy to place.

Making a Compelling Case for Fair Funding

Improving School Facilities in Rural Localities; Zip Code Shouldn't Matter

Rural Virginia, like other rural localities in America, is suffering a school facility crisis. Virginia has over \$25 Billion in recognized need related to our aging school buildings. The State has not provided any financial assistance for school infrastructure since 2009 and has used the State fund set aside for school construction to support the teacher retirement fund.

Through collaboration, advocacy, and innovation our Coalition has worked with the General Assembly to restore school construction funding to the State Budget for the first time in over a decade. This session will explore the creative and collaborative approach that included Press Conferences, Op-Eds, a statewide Crumbling Schools Tour, and bipartisan partnerships that led to our successful advocacy.

FAFSA Frenzy - Creating a college going culture that works!

Understand how a school-wide FAFSA plan and senior capstone project changed the college going culture at Polk County Schools in Tennessee. Learn from the experience of two rural high schools and how they implemented school specific programs to change the college going culture and increase FAFSA completion rates at their schools. Tennessee has increased its FAFSA rates over 20 percent since 2014 and maintained a FAFSA rate over 80 percent.

We will share many of the statewide resources, initiatives, and resources that have been utilized by schools in TN to increase their FAFSA and college-going rates.
